The Priest's Corner

Why Sunday School?

If you are of a certain age, you might remember the claymation show "Davey & Goliath." In my hometown, it was on TV Sunday morning at 7:30 and it played in the background as we prepared to go to church. I think my Sunday school teacher also listened as the story and the lessons went together – or maybe we followed a lectionary that I never knew about. I also read Highlights magazine and the Goofus and Gallant comic had a clear moral/Christian theme, too, so I was exposed to Christian stories, or Bible stories, in popular culture on a regular basis in unexpected places. And I am of that age where we had Christmas concerts every December in school where we sang Christmas carols and very few winter songs. This again reinforced Bible stories and Christianity in a rather vague and general way, but I knew the basic outlines of Christianity and Christian faith. I was also reared Presbyterian in northwestern Pennsylvania where most people were Roman Catholic.

So I knew, as children know, the broad differences between being Protestant and Catholic. And because my mother owned a diner, and because of our school cafeteria, I really understood food requirements of pre-Vatican II Roman Catholics. I was pretty sure no one ate meat on Fridays and during Lent we didn't serve meat on Wednesdays or Fridays. I just thought that's what everyone does. So I had regular exposure to Christianity and Bible stories in my popular culture, my school programs, and the culinary delights of the school cafeteria and my mother's diner. What Sunday School did for me was bring the various strains of broad Christian themes together and help me interpret them as part of my faith formation.

But where are the general popular references to Christianity today? As a college professor, I have observed the gradual decline in young people's understanding of the vocabulary of Christian life, the rhythm of the Church calendar, and the meaning of Christianity and Christian symbols in public life. Last week Colette and I had the opportunity to visit Chautauqua Institution and I was again reminded that Chautauqua was founded in the 19th century to improve Sunday School teaching. So my concerns are part of a long line of concerns about Christian education and knowledge.

But there's something about Sunday School. There's just something about time set aside on Sunday morning for intentional Christian formation. Ideally, we would have Sunday School for adults and youth and every child – because there's something about Sunday School that brings us together and allows us to wonder and talk and discover together, and that if it went away our church lives would be impoverished.

But let's shift this a little. I read a lot about how Sunday Schools are dying. Perhaps what needs to die is the idea that we push our children into the undercroft to allow us to have an "adult" (or simply a quiet) church time. At St. Brendan's we have already pushed this notion aside – we don't have a stuffy, self-centered service that pushes away the creative energy of children. Maybe that's the very thing, the only thing, that is dying – not Sunday School, but that rigid dividing line between what is for the adults and what is for the children, between conventional Christianity, on the one hand, and real, lived spiritually-grounded lives of God's children, on the other.

What I see is when the children rejoin us they come with a vitality and excitement about being with us that their joy spills over. They want to welcome each of us with peace, they rush to the communion rail with joy, they are engaged with what is happening at the Eucharist and they are exuberant.

Our Sunday School is helping to transform our congregation – and we are being led by the children to the joy of being a church. Here at St. Brendan's we are continuing Sunday School as we have in the past – no major upheavals this year (So far! Changes may come.). Allison and I met last week and we are using the curriculum with which we are familiar. Sunday School registration forms are in the narthex. There is also a sign-up sheet for those who would like to be a part of our children and youth's faith formation. So, please register the children who will be in Sunday School and consider how and where you may be called to serve as a Sunday School Storyteller (teacher, facilitator, leader) or a Door Person. And who is the best person to do this? You – your experience with church is unique. Each of us offers a special view of our walk in faith. It is not that we may know all the right answers (we don't), it's that we are willing to continue to join the walk, together, on our journey of faith.

Sunday School is where we unpack in an interactive, age-appropriate way the lessons we hear in our lectionary. Sunday School is where we teach the big concepts of our faith. Sunday School is where we offer space for young minds and bodies to move and be with the Spirit as they learn how to be church with each other.

However, I envision more. In the past few years, the youth in Rite 13 have done service projects, but I would like us to participate more in service projects outside of the church – working with the diocese in food repacking at the Greater Pittsburgh Community Food Bank and for others with 412 Food Rescue; serving at food kitchens like East End Cooperative Ministry or the Hot Metal Community; helping our community doing yard and home clean-up/prep for winter for parishioners or others; helping to fill backpacks for weekend meals for families in need; working with WorldVision for short- and long-term mission possibilities. Sticky Service is what this is called – it links what we teach in church – in Sunday School, from reading the Lectionary, from being in and with each other and God – to the world and how we act as God's hands and feet. Through our Sunday School and service we offer a variety of opportunities for God's message to stick to our children.

Parish Notes. At Monday night's meeting St. Brendan's Vestry:

- Voted to spend \$10,404 to replace two non-functioning air-conditioning units;
- Approved the \$200 purchase of four two-way radios and two air horns to improve church security;
- Adopted a policy that seeks to reduce and ultimately eliminate the kitchen use of disposable products and single-use plastics at St. Brendan's. That means, among other measures, using ceramic plates and cups and steel flatware during Sunday hospitality and no longer purchasing plastic-foam cups and plates, plastic stirrers, plastic-packaged coffee creamers and bottled water. Sunday School Begins September 8

Sunday School both for LAMBS and FISH will begin the week after Labor Day on September 8. All classes are held during the 10:00 a.m. Sunday service. The children will be released to the classes from church after the opening song and greeting with a "commission" from Fr. Regis. They will return for communion.

All classes will use the WHIRL Lectionary curriculum – reading, reflecting on, and discussing the weekly Gospel reading. The children will meet together for a prayer and song. The children will then be broken into two groups: Pre-K to 2nd grade and 3rd to 5th graders. The younger students will follow the Godly Play method for the Bible story presentations.

The two groups will work together seasonally on a service project and will plan and participate in the Children's Liturgy, the 4th Sunday of the month. All children are welcome to participate in the Children's Liturgy by singing, reading the Scriptures, leading the Prayers of the People, serving as ushers, etc.

There will be a meeting on **Sunday, August 25, after the 10:00 a.m. service** for all interested in volunteering or learning about the program. There will be a sign-up sheet in the narthex for teachers/leaders and door persons. All volunteers must have the required clearances.

MUSIC MINISTRY

Senior Choir: I am excited as I look out over all the new faces at St. Brendan's. You can feel the energy and excitement in the air. As we approach the beginning of the new program year I hope that some of you will consider joining our music ministry. Hold that thought – no, you don't have to read music or be musically trained. The only requirement is to love singing and the desire to help enrich our liturgy by enhancing our ways of hearing, praying and experiencing the message of our Lord.

Music has always been an important part of St. Brendan's, even in the early days when just a few people joined together to lead the hymns; now the effort has grown to our largest choir of 15 members. Over the last few years we have had multiple choir members move away and our numbers have dwindled. Having a larger choir takes the pressure off everyone; if someone is sick or wants to take time off to travel or be away, it is easier to carry on. Also, people feel more secure singing in a larger group, plus it truly is fun being a part of a large, active group.

We rehearse on Wednesday evenings from 7:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., learning and reviewing two to three pieces of music. Rehearsal tapes can be provided, if needed. We then meet on Sunday morning at 9:00 a.m. to review the anthem and the hymns before the 10:00 o'clock service. Rehearsals will begin on Wednesday, Aug. 28.

I have begun to choose and work on the anthems we will be singing in September and October and I would love to be optimistic and pick pieces that require a larger group of singers. Please contact me if you are interested. I will be happy to talk with you about time commitments or any other questions you may have.

Chime Choir: The Chime Choir will begin rehearsing in September. This is a multigenerational group for both youth and adults to work together; you must be at least 10 years old to join. It is helpful to read music but not mandatory.

We will be rehearsing on Sundays after church from 11:30 a.m. (about 10 to 15 minutes after the service ends, so everyone can grab coffee and a cookie) until 12:45 p.m. We will rehearse for 45 minutes, with the ending time impacted by the actual start time. 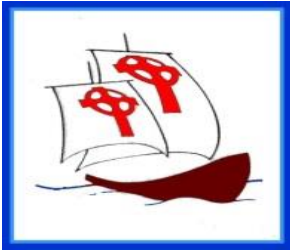
