The Priest's Corner

St. Brendan's Has a Social Justice Ministry...

...and it is off and running! It has an energy, and the latest count is that 14 have become members. I'm not surprised! St. B's has always had an active leaning in the direction of fairness. From its earliest days, our church has been dedicated to giving 10% of its income to many causes that promote social justice. As we formally begin this committee, group, ministry etc., I felt it was fitting to dedicate today's and next week's Priest's Corners to the notion of social justice. This week I want to trace the origins and understandings of social justice. Next week I'll reflect on what to expect now that our social justice group is operating.

The term "social justice" originated in the 1840s with Jesuit priest Luigi Taparelli D'Azeglio coining the term based on the teachings of Thomas Aquinas. The term simply meant justice (treating people fairly) applied to society. At the time, the term social justice was considered a significant contribution to conservative political philosophy.

According to Joseph Carter, "Society ensures social justice when it provides the conditions that allow associations or individuals to obtain what is their due, according to their nature and their vocation." It is linked to the common good and the exercise of authority.

The Oxford English Dictionary defines social justice as "justice in terms of the distribution of wealth, opportunities, and privileges within a society" but vaguely defines justice as the "quality of being fair and reasonable." I really like the way philosopher Gideon Strauss defines it: Justice is "when all God's creatures receive what is due them and contribute out of their uniqueness to our common existence."

Biblical justice is primarily captured in two Hebrew words — mishpat and tzadeqah. Mishpat means treating people equitably. It means acquitting or punishing every person on the merits of the case, regardless of race or social status. Anyone who does the same wrong should be given the same penalty. It also means giving people their rights. (See Dt.18.)

The second Hebrew word for justice tzadeqah can be translated as "being just." It refers to day-to-day living in which a person conducts all relationships in family and society with fairness and generosity.

The New Testament shows Jesus as often reaching out to bring fairness to all people, particularly the marginalized. Whether we use the term or not, Christians are engaged in social justice when we advocate for issues such as abortion, racial reconciliation, immigration fairness, religious liberty, and ending sex trafficking. We engage in social justice whenever we seek moral reform of our society in a way that ensures every person is treated with dignity and given their due.

Our Episcopalian role models emphasize that our churches definitely should advocate for social justice in the sense that ever sinful society needs constant moral reform. The church's chief tool in this advocacy is the gospel itself. Redeemed humanity is likelier to care about justice than those who do not feel redeemed. So, Redeemed Ones, forward we march!

Letter Writing on Immigration. Below is a letter to the congregation from the Justice Committee, a new ministry at St. Brendan's: Hello, Brendanites.

There is a new group formed at St. Brendan's that will address issues specifically related to social justice. We have initiated our efforts by starting a campaign to express our concern and disagreement related to immigration issues and child separation at the border. It's critical for all of us to express our Episcopal beliefs in action. One of the easiest things to do is to let our elected legislators know how we feel. To that end there will be a letter writing campaign on Sunday, July 7, after each of the services. We will provide the paper, envelopes and stamps and will have a sample letter available. Calling our representatives is also a very effective way to express your opinion.

If you'd like to write a letter but won't be at church on Sunday, the website www.contactingcongress.org will give you the address of your House representative by entering your ZIP code. The addresses of Pennsylvania's senators – Republican Patrick Toomey and Democrat Robert Casey – will be found there, too.
