The Priest's Corner

We've Come So Far...Don't Give Up Now! PLUS-Read the PS-Put the Dec. 24th Singing Activity on your schedule for 6:30 PM

I'm recalling how two winters ago. Tom Waseleski, Annemarie Malbon and I labored over a major decision at the time that came upon us due to a Sunday morning snowstorm. Should we or should we not close St. Brendan's for worship? Our historians confirmed that we had only made this move once before in our 30-year history. "Oh what a heavy decision!" we thought. After we had decided to close, the question now was: "How do we get the word out?"

This last year, I can't tell you how many times Tim and I had to face this question, though getting the word out hasn't been too big of an issue.

We've come a long way. We've bitten the bullet over and over. All those smelly face masks, fogged-up glasses and frustrated, acting-as-if-only, fake hugging gestures! "OK, if we have to, we'll do Easter through live streaming." But who could have imagined back then that Christmas, almost \(^{3}\)4 of a year later, would be live streaming only too! We've been thru a lot—and today, this very day, is worse than any day of the pandemic ever! "Covid fatigue? At least!!!"

And yet there's a gentle, from-time-to-time voice down deep in me saying, "Tell them, Regis, not to give up 5 minutes before the miracle occurs." We're also there, Sisters and Brothers. The vaccine is happening, and there are many voices and experiences speaking and showing confidence about it. There does seem to be hope. Most of us will very likely get to witness the outcomes and results of the first vaccine recipients before our turn to get vaccinated comes around. I had a video conference with my doctor yesterday. I trust my doctor because he has helped me make sound healthy choices for over 15 years. He discussed the pros and cons. I was encouraged to share my concerns. After we concluded, I was totally convinced to get the shot when my turn comes. This is not a presumption that you should conclude similarly, but it is a recommendation that you afford yourself a similar process of discernment to the one I gave myself.

I heard an engineer once explain the concept of "project lag." He described it this way. It takes 100% of your energy to accomplish 99% of the project and the other 100% to finish the remaining 1%. I stare at this phenomenon every day as I look up at our loft. Ken and I built this 25 years ago and we really did a great job. We had one more thing to do that would finish the project—put cushioning around two short beams that are lower than the others and invite an occasional head bump when someone over 5'10" walks under those two beams. After all these years—that finishing portion of the project still remains undone. I have smashed my head well over 50 times in the last 25 years. The cushioning is still not up.

So, Brendanites, we are so close to making it through this long pandemic. Don't give up now nor let your guards down—not even for a minute. I've heard many people who came down with Covid 19 say it was at that funeral or friendly get-together or that birthday party. "We were all wearing masks. Just before we left, without even thinking about it, I hugged three family members before I even realized I did it. One of the trio was an asymptomatic carrier." It happens that fast. As Tim reported in his Covid 19 update to our Reopening Committee this week, if you are at a gathering of 25 people in Allegheny County right now, the Georgia Institute of Technology and Stanford University project that there's an over 90% chance that at least one of those 25 will have Covid 19 and be asymptomatic and contagious.

The state of Pennsylvania, and our three counties (Allegheny, Butler and Beaver) are at their highest levels of risk for the virus since the pandemic began. This will pass eventually. It will get better. But until it does, please follow the recommended guidelines: masks, social distancing, avoiding crowds of 10 or more indoors, avoiding public singing, celebrating Christmas only with family members you're currently living with. There are so many good reasons to be hopeful about the future; so as we get closer and closer to this hope's fulfillment, two traits are particularly called for now. These are resilience and self awareness.

Resilience is the ability to cope with the stress of life by bouncing back, trying something important one more time, getting back on that horse. It's an important tool to help us deal with COVID and its implications, even if we have to force ourselves to do it. Self-awareness is the other needed ability to get through to the hopeful end. This is the ability to hit the pause button and notice what is going on for us and around us. "Oh. I left my car without my mask on—no problem, just turn around, go back to the car and put one on." Remember: noticing alone is not enough. It's what we do when we notice things that have positive or not-so-positive implications. We had some furniture delivered recently. We were so excited. The two guys carrying the new couch were very friendly. I didn't even notice they only had their masks around their necks—not on. Finally I realized this and knew I should say something, but a rationalization started: "They'll be out in 30 seconds. It's too late now; they breathed several breaths already." At last I came to my senses and said, "Gents, your face masks will look better on!" Both said, "Sorry—so easy to forget." Off they went and out came my Lysol spray.

We're going to make it through this. We've done well for 9 months so far. Stay positive. Optimism affects our wellbeing and is good for us. We have every reason to believe that positive things will happen in the future.

Stars & Angels



What do you put on the top of your Christmas tree – a star or an angel?

This week, we have the importance of both stars and angels in the Christmas story. Early in the week, Mary is visited by an angel. By Christmas, the wise men are guided by a star to the manger where the baby Jesus is sleeping. So, angels or stars?

Mary was a small-town girl, minding her own business, getting ready to get married, when one day an angel appeared to her. The Angel Gabriel – one of the Archangels – kind of like the supervisor of angels – arrived and told her God had found favor with her. Well Mary was confused and wondered about this – after all, she was just an ordinary person who had never done anything special and she did not know why God would find favor with her.

And that is what made her special. She was just. . .Mary, the girl down the street. She was doing the right things, following the right ways, but she was not holding up any signs that said, "Hey, look at me, I'm doing what God wants me to do" or "I'm the good one." Senior Warden's Corner



A total of eleven years of my life have been spent in Central and Western Massachusetts. One of the more remarkable traditions of life in those parts is the Town Meeting. Although towns and villages may have "selectmen" to administer affairs on a day-to-day basis, they still rely on direct democratic rule for their most significant decisions. The whole community, that is, gathers in one space at least once a year to discuss and vote directly on the business at hand. Norman Rockwell, himself a resident in Western Massachusetts for half his life, made such a Town Meeting the subject of one of his paintings (left) and not much has changed in the years since!

St. Brendan's, it turns out, is not unlike a small New England town. The priest-in-charge, the wardens and the vestry handle routine matters. But once a year, we meet as a parish to discuss and act on any business with significant or long-term implications. Indeed, our Bylaws describe the Annual Parish Meeting (APM)

before they move on to talk about the Vestry. The agenda of each APM must always include the election of three new vestry members and the approval of a budget for the coming year. But this gathering also allows Brendanites to ask questions and address concerns (for which purpose, we circulate an Annual Report shortly before the meeting).

St. Brendan's 2021 Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Sunday, January 24 at 1:00 p.m. This will be the first time we have hosted our APM on Zoom. I encourage you to mark your calendars now and to plan on joining us. We try hard to be efficient in our use of time while still recognizing the importance of allowing everyone who wishes to speak to "have their say." After all the acrimony of this year's political elections, here's a chance to participate in democracy in its most basic and inclusive form!


